MCC, COMMUNITY MAKING BEAUTIFUL MUSIC

An historic fundraising initiative is underway at the MCC Foundation to raise money for 27 new Steinway pianos, making McLennan Community College one of only three colleges in Texas and one of only three community colleges in the country to bear the "All-Steinway School"

With this designation, MCC joins such prestigious institutions as Julliard, the Yale School of Music and Carnegie Mellon, and demonstrates, yet again, MCC's continuing commitment to quality.

In late 2009, recognizing the dire need for new pianos for the Performing Arts programs at MCC, along with the limited funding available for large capital acquisitions, the board of the MCC Foundation approved the All-Steinway School fundraising campaign.

At the time, all of the college's pianos were between 26 and 40 years old and many were in unusable condition. Because the piano is at the heart of all musical, vocal and theatrical training, virtually all students and faculty members in the program were struggling. Rather than address this problem in a piecemeal fashion, and to take advantage of volume discounts and avoid annual price increases, the Foundation board voted to replace

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ALL-STEINWAY CAMPAIGN IN FULL SWING

all the pianos with new, longlasting, highest commercial quality Steinway pianos at a cost of \$611,000. An additional \$300,000 will be raised for a maintenance fund to keep the instruments in top condition for decades to come.

The All-Steinway campaign is the largest fundraising effort undertaken at MCC since the initial capital campaign for the Foundation. Longtime MCC supporters Jim and Judy Haller signed on as chairmen of the campaign, and Ambassador Lyndon and Kay Olson are honorary

lead gift of \$118,000 from Elizabeth Uhl of Minerva, Ohio, mother of MCC voice instructor Lise Uhl. Several other generous individual contributions arrived early to get the campaign off to a strong start. And, this spring, the Cooper Foundation and Waco Foundation each committed to \$100,000 grants to support the initiative. Other foundation grant applications have been submitted to the Allergan Foundation and the Hillcrest Foundation in Dallas. As of July 1, half of the total campaign goal has been achieved.

To raise additional funds, a private fundraising dinner featuring the talents of 16-yearold piano prodigy Bryce Reed was held at the home of Dr. Jim and Mrs. Katherine Pitts in February. The Foundation announced the campaign to its most ardent

supporters at the annual Hearts in the Arts Gala in March. A second private fundraising dinner and concert will be held October 16 at the Waco home of venerable composer and performer Kurt

The largest community fundraising event for the campaign will be on August 28, when the Foundation will host a by-invitation-only *Dueling Grands* piano concert featuring performances by Dr. Donald Balmos and Gail Wade on the grands. The concert will offer some of the finest compositions in The campaign began with a the two-piano repertoire, featuring pieces by Mozart, Brahms and Poulenc. The event is in honor of former Waco Mayor Virginia DuPuy, who is a longtime supporter of music and the arts in Waco. Invitations have been mailed and a standing room only crowd is anticipated.

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"To be honest, MCC taught me collegiate life skills more than anything else. If you see my transcripts, you can tell that I may have not been as mature as I should have been when I started college. It took a full semester of mentoring before I took my college career more seriously. If I would have done this at a larger and more expensive school, I am not sure if I would have continued," he says today.

Scott is a West High School graduate who received a music scholarship to MCC. He studied business and music, and fondly remembers taking religion classes with Dale Hughes, also known as "The Matador" because of his love of bullfighting. Scott then transferred to Baylor and received a BBA in marketing in 1995. He joined the automotive industry right out of college and worked his way up to serve as general manager of an automobile dealership.

Even with his career success, Scott's lifelong dream was to work in government or politics. Last year, he began pursuing positions in the field, and he says he feels fortunate to have found a position right here in his home town. As field representative, he handles local policy issues for Congressman Edwards and is the principal liaison between the 17th District congressional office and local businesses, organizations and citizens.

McKown was one of only three alumni to receive the award at a recognition dinner on April 23 in Commerce, Texas. Started in 1969, the Distinguished Alumni Award is given to A&M-Commerce graduates for their outstanding career achievements.

"Receiving this award is a great honor to me," McKown said. "Texas A&M-Commerce cares about students in a supportive environment, and I am grateful for the opportunities the university provided."

McKown earned her master's degree in secondary and higher education in 1978 from A&M-Commerce, as well as a doctorate in curriculum and instruction in 1990. She joined MCC in 1989 and assumed the presidency in 2009.

FIRST GENERATION COHORT #4 HEADS TO CLASS

The fourth cohort of the First Generation College Student Initiative (FGCSI) met for orientation in May. The 14 students were selected based on merit and their status as the first person in their family to attend college. Through their participation in the FGCSI, they are beginning a two-year journey together as students at MCC, followed by a lifetime of friendship and shared experiences.



The FGCSI program began in 2006, funded by a \$100,000 grant from the Bernard and Audre Rapoport Foundation. Additional grants totaling more than \$200,000 from TG Public Benefits and more than \$300,000 from Rapoport ensured continuation and expansion of the program.

The First Generation program grew from an initial suggestion by former MCC President Dennis Michaelis that MCC needed to work harder to get underserved population students to college and through college successfully. Working with Maggie McCarthy and later Tom Stanton at the Rapoport Foundation, the MCC Foundation staff developed a scholarship with a support program for First Generation students. First Generation students are those students who come from families with no college experience. TG Public Benefits out of Round Rock joined in funding the

marketing and support of the various facets of the program now known as the First Generation College Student Initiative.

Each of the FGCSI students is awarded \$5,000 for tuition, fees and books for two years of study, as well as the opportunity to receive financial assistance and a laptop for 3rd and 4th year studies at a University of Texas system school, Texas Tech or Tarleton State University.

Since its inception, 71 students have participated in the program at MCC, and this year, Santiaga Salas and Denise Rodriguez from Cohort 1 are the first FGCSI participants to earn their bachelor's degrees, both from the University of Texas at Arlington.

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First Generation Scholar: Four Years Later

"It Can Be Done!"

When Santiaga Salas graduated in the top 10 percent of her class from University High School in 2006, she knew she was smart and had a lot of potential. What she didn't realize was that a new program was gearing up at McLennan Community College that would transform that potential into reality and change her future forever.

In late 2005, the McLennan Community College Foundation had received grant money from the Bernard and Audre Rapoport Foundation to launch the groundbreaking First Generation College Student Initiative, designed to help students from families without any college experience successfully get to college and through college. The program not only offered scholarship money, but also mentoring, study skills and time and money management courses, all designed to ensure each student's long-term success.

Santiaga was a perfect candidate for the program. Her parents, Gavino and Romana Sanchez, worked hard to raise and educate their three children, but for them, college was an elusive dream. Santiaga wanted to stay close to home, so she applied to MCC. Her acceptance into the FGCSI program and the generous scholarship it offered were added bonuses.

"First Gen helped me make a smooth transition from high school to college," she says. "Everyone was willing to help and they made it seem like a family ... they were there for any of my questions, concerns, comments and crises."

The support system worked: she graduated from MCC in May 2009 and this spring, received her degree in Elementary Education with honors from the University of Texas at Arlington. Looking on proudly from the audience were her husband Carlos and their children: two-year-old

Reflecting on her years at MCC, Santiaga says she really appreciated the guidance of math instructor Alma Wlazlinski and child development center teacher Pam Briggs and instructor Emily Stottlemyre:

"They made classes fun and took time to talk and care about their students. They provided a great classroom environment."

That great environment is something Santiaga hopes to soon recreate: next month, she will enter the classroom at Provident Heights Elementary as a first grade bilingual teacher for the Waco Independent School District.

"I think of MCC as my second home,"
Santiaga says today. I will never forget what First
Gen did for me and my family because I am officially
the first to go to college and get an Associate's
degree and a B.A. It can be done!"

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News from Resource Development

MCC recently was awarded two grants that will benefit the college's science and respiratory therapy programs. Resource Development at MCC is directed by Nancy Neill.

Science Equipment for Environmental and Energy Engineering

A movement toward applying renewable energy technologies to sustain wastewater operations, decrease cost and conserve and recycle resources has resulted in MCC being awarded a grant for \$197,183 from the State Energy Conservation Office (SECO.) MCC will use the funds to purchase science equipment and to offer a new program in Environmental and Energy Engineering. Resource Development Office Director Nancy Neill worked with Jess Collins, Division Director of Math, Sciences and HPE, on the grant application.

The grant funds will be used to train workers with a solid foundation in biology, chemistry and math to work primarily in municipal water utility plants. Specifically, municipal water utilities in Texas have realized the monetary significance of using anaerobic digestion processes to convert high organic waste into Class A bio-solids (pellets) for reuse as fertilizer. The latest digesters are also designed to capture methane gas (which is a natural by-product of anaerobic digestion) and use the gas to fuel the drying facilities and generators that produce electricity to operate the plants. MCC worked with industry professionals to identify skills and knowledge that are applicable to an array of science-based occupations projected to have high demand in the future. Graduates of the new Environmental and Energy Engineering program may also find employment in other industries that apply chemical and biologic principles to treat and recycle waste and wastewater.

Funding for the SECO grant program was made available by the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act (ARRA.)

Respiratory Care JET Grant

MCC was notified in June that the college will receive \$147,762 for the Respiratory Care Technology (RCT) program. MCC is one of 22 community colleges

across the state that received grant funds to help finance equipment purchases for technical education programs that support high-demand occupations.



The grant money from the Jobs and Education for Texas (JET) Job Building Fund will help Central Texas students get training on the latest equipment for a career as a respiratory therapist.

According to an article in the April 15, 2010 issue of *U.S. News and World Report*, "few jobs have the kind of growth projections as the respiratory therapist occupation." Respiratory therapists help care for patients with lung or heart disorders, and most often, they work in hospitals.

Grant funds will purchase eight ventilators (two different types), eight Intermittent Positive Pressure Breathing (IPPB) machines (two different types), and eight pulse oximeters (two different types) that are used by local employers in this industry. In addition, RCT faculty will be able to use three new notebook computers as they travel to sites across Central Texas where students are located during required clinical rotations. At any time, 65 students are enrolled in the two-year program, and approximately 25 students graduate each year.

RCT Program Chair Doug Gibson credits Providence Healthcare Network, Hillcrest Health System, and Scott & White Hospital for their assistance in securing the grant.
